Monday 28 February

Santiago de Chile



Your adventure starts with an overnight stay in vibrant and lively Santiago de Chile.

The capital city of Chile offers much to explore, from Colonial architecture to gleaming skyscrapers, tranquil parks to Bohemian neighbourhoods, all set against the backdrop of the Andean mountains and glaciers.

Tuesday 1 March

Santiago de Chile-Punta Arenas

(B)

After breakfast, fly to Punta Arenas, Chile's southernmost city, often called "The City at the End of the World". It is also the gateway to the Antarctic peninsula. There you will embark on the world's first hybrid electric-powered expedition ship, MS Roald Amundsen, to begin your Expedition.



Wednesday 2 March

Patagonia - Scenic Beagle Channel

(B/L/D)



Enjoy cruising the scenic Beagle Channel, surrounded by mountains plunging straight into the icy water. This wild and remote area seems almost undisturbed by humans. Take in the isolated islands, hidden bays and rich wildlife that create one the world's most beautiful landscapes.

Thursday 3 - Friday 4 March

Cape Horn - Drake Passage

(B/L/D)

At almost 56° South, Cape Horn is the southernmost tip of South America. Before the Panama Canal, seafarers had to pass this iconic rocky island in order to cross from one side of the Americas to the other.

Depending on weather conditions, crossing through the Drake Passage may take 1.5-2 days. Named after Sir Francis Drake (although he never sailed it!) the Drake Passage is part of the Antarctic Circumpolar Current, the most voluminous current in the world. Roughly 25 to 40 billion gallons of water per second are transported from west to east. As you cross the Drake, you sail over the mid-ocean West Scotia Ridge and over the nearly 20,000 feet deep South Shetland Trench. The Drake is densely populated with plankton, which allows for healthy populations of dolphins, whales, and seabirds.





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5 - 10 March Antarctica (B/L/D)

Isolated from the rest of the world by ocean currents, 90% of the world's ice is here, 13,000 feet thick and covering the entire landmass. In winter months, sea ice forms off the coast, virtually doubling the size of the continent! In summer, it is a breeding ground for millions of penguins, whales, and seals. It's a landscape like no other and defies description. You will be visiting a rare place on earth which has evolved through millenia without human interference. The Expedition will attempt to land at several places, including Deception Island, Half Moon Island, Brown Bluff, Cuverville Island, and Neko Harbor. All of these places are serene and offer untouched nature, opportunities to observe penguin colonies, seals, glaciers, icebergs in every shape and colour, and old whaling stations.







Friday 11- Saturday 12 March

At Sea

(B/L/D)



The ship sets course for the Falkland Islands. The first recorded landing here occurred in 1690 by the HMS Welfare.

Enjoy shipboard lectures which focus on the dramatic history and diverse wildlife of the islands and enjoy watching sea life and landscapes from the decks. Keep your eyes peeled for wandering albatross!

Sunday 13 - Tuesday 15 March

Falkland Islands

(B/L/D)

The Falklands consist of two large islands and around 700 smaller ones. The Falklands are teeming with wonders of wildlife and nature. This is an unpolluted environment with fantastically clear blue skies, seamless horizons, vast open spaces, and stunning white-sand beaches. The westernmost outposts are dotted with remote farms where sheep graze alongside immense colonies of albatross and rockhopper penguins. Carcass Island is a birder's paradise; enjoy a closer look at ducks, geese, penguins, albatrosses, caracaras, and wrens by small boat launch to the shore.



Wednesday 16 March

At Sea

(B/L/D)

The ship sails the loop of the Magellan Sea. On-board, you can enjoy a recap of the Expedition, or simply enjoy time on deck watching for wildlife.

Thursday 17 March

Punta Arenas/Santiago de Chile

(B)

We arrive back in Punta Arenas in the morning and fly back to Santiago de Chile for your flight home or extend your journey with a post-cruise stay (not included).
